Regulatory Update

<u>Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) Removes Requirement for</u> <u>Drivers to Report Annual Violations</u>

A new rule from the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) will no longer require commercial drivers to provide previous traffic violations to their employers on an annual basis. The FMCSA determined that this requirement was "duplicative" as motor carriers are currently required to make an annual inquiry to obtain the motor vehicle record for each driver it employs from every state in which the driver holds or has held a commercial motor vehicle operator's license or permit in the past year. <u>FMCSA Increases Windshield Area for Vehicle Safety Technology; Expands List of</u> <u>Safety Technologies that Qualify</u>

The FMCSA released a final rule that will take effect May 6, 2022, that would expand the area on the interior of a commercial motor vehicle windshield where certain safety technology devices can be mounted. Currently, devices with vehicle safety technologies must be mounted no more than 4 inches below the upper edge of the area swept by the windshield. This change will increase the allowable area to 8.5 inches. Additionally, the definition of vehicle safety technology (see 49 CFR 393.5) was updated to also include braking warning systems, braking assist systems, driver camera systems, attention assist warning, GPS equipment, and traffic sign recognition. Vehicle safety technology includes systems and devices that contain cameras, lidar, radar, sensors and/or video. The final rule can be found here.



2020 Fatal Truck Crash Data

New data from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's (NHTSA) Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS) shows that truck crash deaths and injuries remain unconscionably high, with nearly 5,000 people dying in large truck crashes throughout the United States. Bereavement Update

The Chattanoogan: Bereavement Leave Is Common Sense

An op-ed n the Chattanoogan, recently highlighted an effort in Tennessee to require each local board of education to adopt a bereavement leave policy that authorizes an employee three days of bereavement leave for the death of a member of the employee's immediate family.

Bereavement leave refers to the time off granted to employees who have recently experienced the death of a loved one. Taking bereavement leave does not count toward other forms of scheduled leave.

According to Society for Human Resource Management (SHRM) in 2018, the percentage of businesses offering paid bereavement leave currently stands at almost 90%. Whereas most districts may already offer some form of bereavement leave, this legislation offers clarity, consistency, and direction to provide a guideline that can be replicated statewide. In a mobile workforce such as education, this is much needed.
